CVA President to be Presented OIE Meritorious Award

Abdul Rahman, President the Commonwealth Veterinary Association and Chairman of the OIE Animal Welfare Working Group and former Dean of the Bangalore Veterinary College, Bangalore India has been awarded the 2015



World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE) Meritorious Award for his contribution to the veterinary profession through his work on animal welfare, zoonosis with special reference to the control of Rabies and for his work on veterinary education.

The meritorious award of the OIE is granted annually by the OIE to personalities who have distinguished themselves as a way to recognise internationally their outstanding technical, scientific and administrative contributions to the field of veterinary science, control of animal disease, animal welfare and/or to veterinary public health.

The award will be presented to Dr.Abdul Rahman on Sunday 24th May 2015 during the Opening Ceremony of

the 83rd Session of the OIE World Assembly of Delegates in Paris, France.

PCVC6 and 27th VAM Congress

The 6th Pan Commonwealth Veterinary Conference of the CVA and the 27th Veterinary Association Malaysia (VAM) congress was successfully completed on March 27th at Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Five hundred and fifteen (515) registered participants attended the conference. Of these, 125 were international participants from 44 countries.

The conference was inaugurated on Monday 23rd March by the Minister of Agriculture and Agro-based Industry, Government of Malaysia, Dato' Sri Ismail Sabri Yaakob and the conference was closed on Thursday 26th March by Dato' Haji Tajuddin Abdul Rahman Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Agro-based Industry.

The CVA held its Executive Committee meeting on Sunday 22nd and the CVA Council Meeting on Monday 23rd where in the action plan for the next four years was discussed.

The Scientific Conference with the theme "Providing Holistic Solutions to Changing Global Challenges – Threats and Opportunities for Veterinarians", given by



13 plenary speakers and 69 invited speakers for 10 parallel scientific sessions provided a platform and opportunity for all delegates to hear and participate in the discussions in each session. There were also 120 posters presented.

In summary, it was an opportunity for veterinarians to provide holistic solutions to changing global challenges.

Recipes from the world - from Australia

Minimum effort/maximum effect Roast Leg of Lamb

Ingredients

- 1 leg of lamb
- 1 cup of fruit chutney such as mango or pawpaw chutney
- 1 cup of soy sauce

Method

Mix together the chutney and soy sauce into a paste. Place the leg of lamb into an oven roasting bag or onto a sheet of aluminium cooking foil. You could also put it into a large casserole dish or cooking pot. Thoroughly smear the leg of lamb with the chutney/soy paste and tie off the oven roasting bag or cover the meat with foil to seal it. Roast the lamb until cooked (approximately 75

to 90 minutes depending on the size of the leg of lamb). Serve with roast potatoes, beans, sweet potato or other vegetables and or salad.
